While the temperature outside is in the high 80s/low 90s right now and I am seeing a lot of people's Facebook feeds or hearing stories about beach travels, this is definitely not beach week for me, unfortunately. As most of you know, this time of year is enormously busy with the planning and preparing for five special holidays and the start of Religious School. I say it not to complain, but to recognize this annual cycle of craziness, and also to empathize when you talk about this being a busy time of year for you too. As many of you know, I argue with God every year about the calendar. I still have not won the argument, but I can feel it. I'm getting closer to wearing God down on this one. (God is shaking Her head right now and saying Oy!)

Recently, someone was interviewing me and asking about some of my favorite things and also my biggest worry. While I have lots of favorites, I do also have an ongoing worry: I know societally we are so busy and we are so willing to assimilate, but my worry is that Judaism will get



lost and forgotten or die out. I say that not to guilt anyone,

but to share my fear. Yes, many of you are busy. Yes, many of you happily assimilate. I actually think that assimilation in and of itself is neutral, but that is a topic for another time. Please do not let go of your identity.

I wish I could convince you that Judaism is amazing and important on so many levels. I wish I could convince you that it is okay if you say you do not believe in God or you do not think you can celebrate every holiday the way it "should" be celebrated. What does that really mean anyway?! I wish I could convince you that each holiday is actually really special and powerful and you can make it your own and that it does not have to be an all or nothing. I wish I could convince you that so much of who you are is implicitly (or maybe explicitly) part of your Jewish identity or Jewish-adjacent identity. (continued on page 6)

High Holy Day Honors

As is our custom, we use the High Holidays as one of our opportunities to say thank you. Everyone who receives an honor during the High Holidays is nominated by one, if not more, member of the Leadership Group (Committee Chairs, Board, etc.) for their efforts to Or Chadash over the past year. We thank them for their dedication, and hope that in the coming year, you too will be an active volunteer and be on the bimah during Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur. To all our current volunteers: THANK YOU! Our sacred family is great because of you!

Kosher Policy

As we move back into various food events at Or Chadash, please be mindful of our kosher policy. This includes any/all Temple events on Temple property plus religious school and youth group field trips.

Did you know that we have a kosher policy at Congregation Or Chadash? If you are not familiar with our policy, or to make sure that everyone remembers, here it is:

Kashrut is the term applied to foods that meet Jewish religious requirements. It is used in the sense of food that is ritually clean and edible. Kasher or Kosher means fit to eat. Congregation Or Chadash asks that all people using the building or on Temple grounds, including our members, show respect for our sacred tradition, so that all food served is acceptable to all of our members. Or Chadash follows Biblical Kosher rules meaning:

- There should be no treif at all in the building (i.e., no pig and no shellfish)
- There should be no mixing of milk and meat (includes chicken) throughout the entire event. This includes "large" or "small" ingredients. Examples include:
 - Cheeseburgers
 - Chicken dinner with rolls and butter
 - Chicken dinner with ice cream for dessert
 - A cake made with butter at a meal with meat
- There may not be dairy foods at one table and meat foods at a different table.
- Pareve means something neutral, such as fish or eggs and can be served with either dairy or meat. It means the items cannot even have minor meat or milk ingredients.

If students are at a Congregation Or Chadash Religious School program outside of the Temple as part of their Religious School class, we expect them to follow the Congregation Or Chadash Kosher Policy.

Children's High Holiday Babysitting

We have babysitting available on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur mornings for our Or Chadash families and prospective families. Geared toward children third grade and younger, the children will enjoy age-appropriate activities, stories, and snacks. On Rosh Hashanah, the children will also be brought into the sanctuary during the shofar service. There is no cost to attend, but you MUST RSVP.

Rise Against Hunger

Back by popular demand! This Yom Kippur we are doing our seventh annual feed-the-hungry program! After morning services, we will be providing an opportunity to directly feed the hungry. While we still will be doing our local food drive for Manna (and hope you will give), this Yom Kippur we will also do a project that will have an international focus. This year we will be packing over 11,000 meals to ship to people inneed in food impoverished parts of the world. In the last few years, our food went to Haiti, Madagascar, New Orleans, as a few examples.

The program has strict requirements and one is a large indoor space. Thus, the program will occur immediately after morning services and will go (give or take on the timing) until afternoon services. I ask, in advance, for your patience as there might be a bit of "organized chaos," both at the conclusion of morning services and again before the start of afternoon services.

The event is open to anyone ages 4 and above who wishes to help. People need to wear closedtoed shoes and we will be standing as we pack the boxes of food. People will need to wear gloves and hair nets, both of which they provide. As found in the Torah. God commands us to feed the hungry. Will you help? If you are interested, please sign up on the link below. If you have trouble, let me know and I would be happy to sign you up. We are looking for approximately 40 volunteers at any one time. If there is high demand, we will slightly alter the shift time slots to ensure that anyone who wishes to engage in this mitzvah may do so. If you are signing up multiple people within your household, please list everyone individually so we know who to expect.






Congregation Or Chadash Book Club

Social Action Committee Supporting Refugees

In concert with New Neighbors Interfaith Alliance (NNIA), we have recently welcomed three new refugee families into our community and shared in the joy of new life for two families who welcomed new babies! We helped breadwinners in two families find jobs so that they can advance on the road to independence. We continued to be engaged with around 26 families and individuals who occasionally look to us for help.

One of our newest families is a Ukrainian family. Mom, Dad, and the two girls (middle & elementary school) have recently moved to a rental in Damascus. Dad has a good job, and Mom would love some assistance in finding an entry-level job for herself. She is great with communicating using Google Translate, but she would love to have a tutor with whom she could practice using conversational English. While the dad has a Commercial Driver's License (CDL), the mom has a Ukrainian driver's license, but could use help getting a Maryland driver's license. Also, the mom and the eldest daughter need a driver to help them get to Children's Hospital in Rockville about once a month. NNIA is hoping that some Or Chadash folks will volunteer to help this family, as ours is the closest organization to this family. We already have a local lead who can help coordinate, and answer your questions about how to help.

You can drop the items off in a bin in the temple lobby. The temple building is now open 9:30am-2:00pm Tuesday-Friday (but please call first: 301-482-1025), or you can bring the items before Friday-evening Shabbat services (someone can open the door starting at 6:30pm). If it's more convenient for you, order the items online and have them sent to the temple. The staff will quickly know that a box of dental floss, say, belongs in the Care Bags bin!

Once we have assembled enough supplies, the Social Action Committee will announce a time when members of the congregation can come join us in assembling the bags. Congregants can carry one or two in their car to give to homeless individuals. We are also partnering with the Montgomery County mental-health organization *Every Mind*, which has offered to accept as many of these bags as we can provide. They will distribute the bags to individuals that they help, including homeless veterans.

The third is awaiting a little girl, who is expected in early September.

The committee members have now begun knitting scarves and some hats for a Ukrainian refugee family in Damascus.

Summary of the Tishrei Cycle (starting with Selichot and talking about Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah)

Saturday, September 9 starts the fall holiday season in earnest with Selichot, a holiday that sets the mood for Rosh Hashanah by offering a few of the prayers and melodies and moments of reflection. Events begin at 5:30pm that evening with a potluck dinner, an education program for people of all ages (including a honey tasting), and the service at 7:00pm, followed by s'mores.

Sunday, September 10 at 10:00am will be Reverse Tashlich. Tashlich is a communal ritual to help cast off our "sins," free ourselves of the past, and an opportunity to come together as a COC community to engage in social action and mindfulness. 
