

I have been consumed with reading the news from accurate sources, checking in with my Israeli friends, having conversations with people of all ages, both Or Chadash-ites and beyond, and just being Israel focused pretty much non-stop.

I encourage you to make sure you are reading actual facts about Israel and Hamas, and not hold on to biased reporting which happens far too often here in America. I encourage you to call out your non-Jewish friends and neighbors who have collectively been all too silent on Israel (and, yes, I know there have been wonderfully supportive people as well).

I had an opt-in, parent-supported talk about Israel with many of our Religious School students. Like the adults, the students wanted us to do something. At the time of writing this column, tzedakah/financial donations continue to be the

number one thing we can do. If you need help in finding

Usually, I give a couple of years for people to plan a Temple trip so we can all financially save for it, but perhaps we will be able to pull off a trip sooner. Please hold that thought in the back of your mind.

Saturday, December 30 – 9:30am Torah Study *Vayechi (Genesis 47:28-50:26)* What does Judaism say about adoption? Why does Jacob stay in Egypt after the famine has ended? Why does Jacob bless people in such a strong way? How does the death and burial of Jacob reflect current Jewish practice?

President's Column

As I am sitting down to write this article, it has been 7 days since Hamas began its horrendous action and reign of terror in Israel and once again, our spiritual homeland has been in the position of heightened peril. Like all of you, I am sure, I have been saddened and fearful as I have been working to process events, both from the day itself and the full response since. And things feel, to me, especially heinous with these events starting as the Tishrei Cycle was coming to a close.

At first, I was in shock and in a state of disbelief. I followed my family's "24-hour rule" where I watch the news reports coming out in the first 24 hours waiting to see how things settle before taking any action. I do this because I have seen how the competitive nature of many news sources sometimes cause them to report inaccurate information in order to be the first to break the story ... followed by corrections and redacted reports. Even though I hoped that was the case here, this did not get easier to stomach over time. Things kept getting worse as more details were learned and reported. And my heart breaks for Israel.

I have never considered myself a Zionist. Don't misunderstand me ... I don't consider myself anti-Zionist. And I am very much pro-Israel. But I am also a pacifist who believes that everyone has a right to exist. For a very long time, despite knowing there were valid reasons behind it, I believed that Israel's treatment of the Palestinians was extremely antagonistic and there were times when Israel seemed to invite violence in their lack of respect towards their neighbors. Then Yitzhak Rabin became Israel's Prime Minister and, for the first time in my memory, recognized that the Palestinians are people who deserve the same rights to exist as the Israelis. This

statement revealed that coexistence may be possible. And this public recognition opened the door for the first time, towards negotiations to achieve an everlasting peace. From this point forward, my Zionist feelings grew stronger. Unfortunately, this policy, while applauded by many, caused him to make many enemies and eventually led to his assassination. And while this path towards peace had begun, it has stalled many times, and I find myself wondering: if Rabin had survived, could this whole action have been avoided with a mutual understanding existing between the Israelis and the Palestinians?

Even though this is taking place nearly 5900 miles away, we see similarities in attitudes within the United States. We seem to have forgotten that we are a planet made up of PEOPLE who share this space. We may look different. We may have different genders or religious beliefs. We may not agree on the political topics of the day. But in the end, we are skin covering muscle and bone with heart, lungs, brain, liver ... well, you get the point. To (not exactly) quote my ALL-TIME favorite television series, "We are the universe made manifest, trying to understand itself." These things that divide us with such violence do nothing to give us strength, but only show everyone the worst of ourselves and the anarchy that is part of our inherent nature that we have (in theory) learned to control over the millennia.

We need to do better. We need to be better.

Religious School Committee



The book for November is *Defending Britta Stein* by Ronald H. Balson. This book is available at the Montgomery County Public Libraries.




