Or Chadash FOCUS

What are your experiences when it comes to prayer? Do you enjoy it? Is it routine? Is it foreign? Do you connect with the words or do you feel separate from them? There are two types of prayer: fixed prayer and spontaneous prayer from the heart, known in Hebrew as keva and kavannah. According to Judaism, both are critical to us as a people.

Kavannah allows us to pray by ourselves near an ocean or in the woods or in our homes, wherever and whenever we see fit. These are personal prayers, yet made with great intent. We need these private opportunities with God or with ourselves.

We equally need the keva, the fixed



prayer, to allow us a sense of comfort, a sense of the routine, perhaps even to give us a perceived sense of control. Keva allows us to go to any synagogue around the world and join in prayer. Even if we do not know the language of a particular country, the Hebrew binds us together and allows us to engage in community. (continued on page 5)

For this newsletter, I decided to share my personal story of how I came to join Congregation Or Chadash. As a congregation, we are currently at just over 100 families with full membership, and I realize each of us has our own story of how we came here. For some, it was looking for a synagogue to be affiliated with. Others may have been looking for a religious school, and there are approximately 98 other reasons why we found our way here.

But this is MY story. And it has two sides.

First the "easy" issue. I am the mother in an interfaith household. This is not something that I had anticipated when I was growing up (there was no question in my mind that I would marry a "nice Jewish boy") but life doesn't always work out the way you envision it at such a young age. In addition to marrying a Christian, I married someone whose family is quite devout in their worship and faith. So, when my husband and I started talking about having children and in what faith we would raise them, I always feared how he and his family would respond, because I always planned on having a "Jewish Home" (even with my interfaith marriage). I was lucky ... my husband agreed with me that religion follows the mother. So, regardless of his faith, my children, and hence his, would be Jewish. But having that knowledge was only the first step.

I still had to address my concerns about his family. How would they react to their grandchildren / nieces and nephews / cousins being Jewish rather than Christian? This worry was all in my head ... they have accepted everyone and embraced our faith. But it handicapped me from finding a place to join until I really had no choice and my oldest was about to fall behind if we didn't start preparing for B'nai Mitzvah. So, even though I was kind of on the fringes, the time had come for me to jump in and do something about it. That is where Congregation Or Chadash really comes into my story. Here, many of us live in interfaith households. So, I know that I am not alone and that made my joining feel much easier. My husband also feels welcome, even though he has not walked away from his faith. We are accepted here, and that means the world to me.

But the other side of my story is really where Or Chadash is special for me. Two of my childern fall under the "Special Needs" umbrella. They have faced challenges fitting in in pretty much every way their entire lives. And I have spent so much time over the years explaining them to others, or apologizing for them because they don't measure up to other people's expectations. But at Or Chadash, I have learned over the years, that the people here accept them for who they are. No excuses. No apologies needed. No explanations. Just them being the incredible individuals that they are, who proverbially "march to their own drummer." No one questions. No one worries. No one stares. They just accept them. Period. There aren't many places where that is the case. But at Or Chadash, it is. I don't know how much my children see this or if this is just for my eyes, but I do notice it almost every time I bring them into the building. And that matters to me.

So, through Congregation Or Chadash, I found my spiritual home. My reasons may not resonate with you, or perhaps they do. And now, sitting on the board, I see our efforts in trying to make everyone feel comfortable, without sacrificing our principles or values. This is not true at every religious institution I have seen and it is something that I truly cherish in my spiritual home.

May you feel as comfortable here as I do.

Worship is meant to be joyful, filled with our voices in song. Even before the start of the core service (i.e. beginning with the Barchu) we offer our voices in preparatory prayer, singing not only "an opening song," but also different psalms that allow us to praise God, and Shalom Aleichem or L'cha Dodi, welcoming the Sabbath angels or Sabbath bride if it were Shabbat, etc. We are meant to actually have multiple songs at the beginning of a service. Just as when we go to the gym, we warm up our bodies before engaging in the core of our workouts. In the Reform movement, even our fixed prayers sometimes provide a challenge. There are so many melodies for the different prayers that sometimes knowing the words is not enough. A new melody might throw us off, but like any keva experience, the more services we attend, the more those new melodies become not so new. I am delighted that Shabbat attendance has been up this summer. I hope it continues and you find new and familiar melodies that enter your fixed prayers!

The Tishrei cycle (the month that has Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah) provides even more challenges when it comes to prayer: there are extra services, different melodies, and there are more prayers in the service.

Depending on who you are, the Tishrei cycle likely allows you to feel further reflection or further connection, or further boredom (not by me, but yes, I know some of you feel that way!). Some of your reaction to prayer is how you walk in to the service. What is your attitude? What do you hope to get from the experience? Your attitude actually will impact your result. My September/October 2024 hope is that that you will draw closer connections to the High Holiday themes of teshuvah (repentance) and chesbon hanefesh (introspection). My hope is that whether the melodies are familiar or foreign, whether the words directly resonate or not, that you explore the prayerbooks with an open heart and find something that echoes deep within yourselves. Join us in prayer. Come not only on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, but on Sukkot and Simchat Torah, and Shabbat. Use this season to renew yourself and strengthen your keva and kavannah. See you at Temple!

Av, Elul, Tishrei 5784-5785 **Kosher Policy**

Please be mindful of our kosher policy. This includes any/all Temple events on Temple property plus Religious School and youth group field trips.

Did you know that we have a kosher policy at Congregation Or Chadash? If you are not familiar with our policy, or to make sure that everyone remembers, here it is:

Kashrut is the term applied to foods that meet Jewish religious requirements. It is used in the sense of food that is ritually clean and edible. Kasher or Kosher means fit to eat. Congregation Or Chadash asks that all people using the building or on Temple grounds, including our members, show respect for our sacred tradition, so that all food served is acceptable to all of our members. Or Chadash follows Biblical Kosher rules meaning:

- There should be no treif at all in the building (i.e., no pig and no shellfish)
- Gelatin is made from pigs and is not okay. It is found in marshmallows and in many candies.
- There should be no mixing of milk and meat (includes chicken) throughout the entire event. This includes "large" or "small" ingredients. Examples include:
 - Cheeseburgers
 - Chicken dinner with rolls and butter
 - Chicken dinner with ice cream for dessert
 - A cake made with butter at a meal with meat.
- There may not be dairy foods at one table and meat foods at a different table.
- Pareve means something neutral, such as fish or eggs and can be served with either dairy or meat. It means the items cannot even have minor meat or milk ingredients.

If students are at a Congregation Or Chadash Religious School program outside of the Temple as part of their Religious School class, we expect them to follow the Congregation Or Chadash Kosher Policy.

Social Action Committee Supporting Refugees

New Neighbor Interfaith Alliance (NNIA) is continuing to set records for the number of new refugee families endorsed by our Steering Committee for sponsorship this year! Thus far, we have accepted 15 new families in 2024. We provide various types of assistance to 46 families, including 16 families who are receiving some level of financial support. Overall, we are impacting the lives of more than 240 individuals through the services and financial aid that we have been able to provide, thanks to our invaluable network of generous and kind-hearted volunteers and donors!

There are always many volunteer needs. We would like to highlight two priority needs. The first is to work with family breadwinners to find jobs. This includes helping develop resumes, identifying job opportunities online or via posted Help Wanted signs, and taking the candidate to potential places of employment.

The second priority need is for tutors to help our new neighbors learn English. Almost every family needs at least one tutor, and no experience is required. NNIA will help you select the resources you can use to tutor.

Rise Against Hunger

Back by popular demand! This Yom Kippur we are doing our eighth annual feed-the-hungry program! After morning services, we will be providing an opportunity to directly feed the hungry. While we still will be doing our local food drive for Manna (and hope you will give), this Yom Kippur we will also do a project that will have an international focus. This year we will be packing over 11,000 meals to ship to people in-need in food impoverished parts of the world. In the last few years, our food went to Haiti, Madagascar, New Orleans, as a few examples. Last year it went to Honduras.

The program has strict requirements and one is a large indoor space. Thus, the program will occur immediately after morning services and will go (give or take on the timing) until afternoon services. I ask, in advance, for your patience as there might be a bit of "organized chaos," both at the conclusion of morning services and again before the start of afternoon services.

The event is open to anyone ages 4 and above who wishes to help. People need to wear closedtoed shoes and we will be standing as we pack the boxes of food. People will need to wear gloves and hair nets, both of which they provide. As found in the Torah, God commands us to feed the hungry. Will you help? If you are interested, please sign up on the link below. If you have trouble, let me know and I would be happy to sign you up. We are looking for approximately 40 volunteers at any one time. If there is high demand, we will slightly alter the shift time slots to ensure that anyone who wishes to engage in this mitzvah may do so. If you are signing up multiple people within your household, please list everyone individually so

we know who to expect.

We look forward to Yom Kippur and this special Rise Against Hunger program. Sign up here!

FOR MEMBERS OF CONGREGATION OR CHADASH

Congregation Or Chadash is now a Partner Congregation in the Garden of Remembrance (Gan Zikaron) Memorial Park in Clarksburg, Maryland. The synagogue has purchased permanent interment rights in a section of the 150-acre nonprofit memorial park (see map on reverse).

The Garden of Remembrance memorial counselors are available to meet or speak with Or Chadash families to discuss advance planning or at-need arrangements and to assist in the selection of spaces in the Or Chadash section of the memorial park.

Or Chadash members and their families receive a 10% Partner Congregation reduction on the interment rights. The regular price is \$2,900* per space which is reduced to \$2,610 for Or Chadash members. All spaces also require a one-time \$290 fee towards the Perpetual Endowed Care Trust Fund.

To assist in planning, the following represent the current, usual costs* associated with a burial at Garden of Remembrance Memorial Park:

-Interment (opening/closing of grave)\$1	,950
-Installed Concrete Grave Liner\$	900

The Garden of Remembrance Memorial Park also offers the largest, most affordable selection of memorials and markers in the Greater Washington area.
