President's Column

For this newsletter, I wanted to talk to you about Temple Security.

This is a topic that many of us are concerned about these days. With antisemitism on the rise for several years and fears of possibly being targeted, the Board of Directors has worked very hard to make sure we all feel safe within our building. And I wanted to take this opportunity to highlight a few of the things the board has done since the shooting at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, PA in 2018.

Until about a year ago, we had a grant issued by the federal government (2 awards of the same grant, each lasting 3 years). Using this money, we have made significant improvements to the structure of the building ranging from placing bollards and boulders protecting us from someone crashing into the building to security doors and other improvements. We also installed a keypad lock on our front door.

When we made these physical improvements to our building, we also added policies to help keep us all safe. We instituted "Greeters" for every service. A congregant (who has sat through training) is assigned to watch the door as people come and go. This person opens the door (as it automatically locks upon closing) and welcomes any congregant or visitor. That greeter guesses when everyone has arrived and then is free to attend the meeting or service occurring at that time. They leave a sign on the door with their contact information and arriving congregants/ visitors are invited to call or text the number and the greeter will allow them access. The greeter welcomes these contacts, even if it is in the

middle of a service, so if you see the sign on the door and wish entry, please do not be afraid to reach out to the greeter so you can be welcomed into the building.

Another thing this and other grants have allowed is for security personnel to be present on site at times where there are more members present. We use this service for High Holiday services, B'Nai Mitzvah services, religious school, and various events where we expect higher attendance. The money to pay for this has been coming from these grants, but those funds are limited. We have applied for more funding for this purpose and continue to look for other grants for these types of services. We are still working with the company that contracts our security personnel needs and will reach out to them whenever there is a need.

We have also formalized a firearms policy. While we do not permit guns on site (in general), there are some exceptions. An excerpt of this policy is posted in this newsletter. But anyone carrying a firearm on our property must register with temple leadership before bringing a firearm on the property.

All of these things are done in an effort to ensure we have a safe place to worship, teach, learn and enjoy. Everyone should always feel safe in a house of worship, and we are doing all we can to ensure that we can say that about Congregation Or Chadash.

Firearms Policy at Congregation Or Chadash

This is an excerpt of our firearms policy. This policy was approved by the Board of Directors on May 8, 2024. (This policy is applicable to staff, members, visitors, contractors, vendors, and all others who may be in the building or on Temple grounds. Professional security personnel hired by the Congregation for security purposes are handled separately.)

The table above describes who can/cannot have a firearm within the Temple building or on the Temple grounds based on an individual's association with both an Organizational and Professional group. For example, a Security Professional who is part of temple staff or a member may be in possession once preapproval occurs per conditions described under (2), as defined here. By contrast, a Security Professional who is a temple guest ("Other individual on Temple grounds" row in table) is never allowed.

1. Staff/members who are retired law enforcement officers and qualify under LEOSA (Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act) to carry a firearm may do so, but only after all documentation has been presented to and validated by the Temple Board of Directors. This is a pre-approval process that is required before coming to Temple with a firearm.

- 2. Staff/members who are security professionals as defined above may carry a firearm, but only after all documentation of such qualifications/certifications have been presented to and validated by the Temple Board of Directors. This is a pre-approval process that is required before coming to Temple with a firearm.
- 3. Active sworn officers who are not staff/members must show valid credentials to temple leadership present at the service or event upon arrival at the building.

Administrative aspects:

- Anyone permitted to be in possession of a firearm in the building by this policy should notify a representative of Temple leadership upon arriving at the building with a firearm. Examples of temple leadership in this scenario include the Rabbi, a Board member, or other designated representative of Temple leadership as determined by the Board of Directors.
- Anyone not permitted per this policy to be in possession of a firearm in the building, if identified, will be required to secure the firearm in a safe manner, per local law, outside of the building. This could be in a locked vehicle on-site (in accordance with local law) or off-site. If the individual will not or cannot secure the firearm outside the building they will be asked to leave. Police will be immediately notified for noncompliance with this policy.

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Social Action / Social Justice

We are so excited to have a new chairperson of the Social Justice / Social Action Committee! Please help welcome (and support) Arlene Greenspan to this important role. Social justice and social action have long been vital parts of Judaism and especially Reform Judaism. Rabbi Tarfon declared "it is not your duty to finish the work, but neither are you at liberty to neglect it." Alternatively stated, we know that while we do not have to solve all the problems of the world, it is our responsibility to make the world better

Every month, we will be focusing on a different issue and different projects that go with it. In that way, we can be more intentional and more active about our social justice work. For example, September was the Get Out the Vote campaign and the importance of voting rights. October focused on feeding the hungry, both with Rise Against Hunger and our collection for Manna. Our plan for November will be expressing gratitude with all that we have and in turn helping those who are less fortunate. We will be collecting for Comfort Cases, helping foster children have backpacks filled with core belongings, rather than being forced to carry trash bags with their stuff and also looking to see if we can collect backpacks for students who go hungry on the weekends when they do not have meals at school. December will focus on our bringing the light and, as part of it, working in a shelter. Stay tuned for more details as we grow and evolve our social justice and social action work. Other months will include a focus on health, dating violence (or in the positive: healthy relationships), people with disabilities, refugees, gun violence prevention, aging, interfaith work, human sex trafficking prevention, LGBTQ+ rights, suicide prevention, racial justice, and women's health. Stay tuned for more information.

Additionally, now that we have a chair of the committee, we would like to have regular committee meetings to grow and expand our projects and volunteerism.

The first meeting of this newly formed committee will be **Wednesday**, **November 6** at 7:00pm (Zoom only). We look forward to working together for the betterment of all.

Supporting Refugees

New Neighbor Interfaith Alliance (NNIA) is continually being contacted by recent immigrant families in need. Our Steering Committee has added three more Afghan families, one Haitian family and one Rohingya family from Myanmar to our supported families in just the last two months. Our goal is to get them stable with jobs and improved English, so that they are able to support themselves.

There are always many volunteer needs. We would like to highlight two priority needs. The first is to work with family breadwinners to find jobs. This includes helping develop resumes, identifying job opportunities online or via posted Help Wanted signs, and taking the candidate to potential places of employment.

The second priority need is for tutors to help our new neighbors learn English. Almost every family needs at least one tutor, and no experience is required. NNIA will help you select the resources you can use to tutor.

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Congregation Or Chadash Book Club



Congregation Or Chadash is now a Partner Congregation in the Garden of Remembrance (Gan Zikaron) Memorial Park in Clarksburg, Maryland. The synagogue has purchased permanent interment rights in a section of the 150-acre nonprofit memorial park (see map on reverse).

The Garden of Remembrance memorial counselors are available to meet or speak with Or Chadash families to discuss advance planning or at-need arrangements and to assist in the selection of spaces in the Or Chadash section of the memorial park.


Or Chadash members and their families receive a 10% Partner Congregation reduction on the interment rights. The regular price is \$2,900* per space which is reduced to \$2,610 for Or Chadash members. All spaces also require a one-time \$290 fee towards the Perpetual Endowed Care Trust Fund.

To assist in planning, the following represent the current, usual costs* associated with a burial at Garden of Remembrance Memorial Park:

-Interment (opening/closing of grave)	\$1	.,950
-Installed Concrete Grave Liner	\$	900
