
Or Chadash FOCUS

We know we are living in uncertain times. Wherever you are socially or politically, social justice is part of our Jewish core and values are part of our basic fiber. The prophet Micah (6:8) reminds us "to do justice, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with God." I hold those words in my heart and I will continue to fight in support of who we are as a people. Even in these challenging times, I am also determined to continue to look for the good in others while lifting up our Jewish values. I signed on to the following letter, along with approximately 600 other rabbis. I believe it is important to share who we are as a people.

A Statement of Jewish Beliefs

In this time of swirling events and governmental chaos, it is



- 1. We believe that all people are the children of God, endowed with holiness, all equal in value. (Gen. 1:27)
- 2. We believe in welcoming the stranger, the alien in our midst, the one who lives with us. (Lev. 19:33) We are commanded to love the stranger as ourselves. We are a people of repeated migrations, descended from strangers in Egypt.
- 3. We believe in honesty, commanded not to bear false witness (Ex. 20:13, Lev. 19:11)
- 4. We believe in listening respectfully, valuing the ideas of those who disagree, and seeking peace. (Avot 1:12, 1:18)
- 5. We believe in fairness in business and all transactions: not engaging in fraud, paying workers promptly, honestly representing what is offered. (Lev.19:13; 19:35-36)

- 6. We believe in respect for others, especially for the strangers among us, for elders and those less fortunate, and all who struggle. We are commanded not to take advantage of the weakness of others, not to place a stumbling block before the blind. (Lev. 19:32; 19:14) We feel it is important to engage in acts of kindness and believe that we are in relationship with all people and should behave with compassion and empathy. (Avot 1:2)
- 7. We call what we give to others tzedakah, giving based on justice. We believe in the importance of compassion, but what we give to others in need is based on seeking justice in society.
- 8. We believe in knowledge and the exchange of ideas, including minority viewpoints. We value learning and the advancement of knowledge, in

science, in literature, sacred and secular. (Avot 1:16)

- 9. We believe in respecting and caring for our world, for tending the land and acting as dedicated stewards. (Gen 1:29-30 and Lev. 19:23 ff.)
- 10. We cherish the religious freedom in the United States and celebrate the diversity of beliefs and practices in our country. We deeply value the American Constitutional guarantees separating religion and state that have made possible the flourishing of all religions in our country.

President's Column

We are all affected by what is happening in the world around us. Sometimes, this is limited to our own home. Other times, it's a larger community. And yes, this includes our congregation. But we are all influenced by, and form opinions on, what we see and learn. One of these topics has been in the news quite a bit these last few months.

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion--commonly known as DEI. It's important to spell it out. While making it easier to write, acronyms often make us lose sight of meaning. It makes it easy to dismiss it as unnecessary or superfluous. But, at least in this case, it is anything but. And it is something that affects every part of our lives. And again, yes, that includes our lives at Congregation Or Chadash.

Diversity at Congregation Or Chadash is apparent, simple and clear. We have member households that are both 100% Jewish and interfaith; born into Judaism and Jewish by choice/conversion, and more. In our eyes, you are Jewish regardless. And that's what's

important. You are a highly valued member of our community regardless of how you view your "Jewishness". None of our member households are a clone of another. And those differences shape our congregation. We take pride in being a diverse community. Diversity is important.

We all grew up learning the ideal that we are all created equal. However, "equity" is not quite the same thing as "equality". Equality means that we are all entitled to the same things. Equity requires us to allow equal access to resources that should be available to all. One tangible demonstration of this is that people who aren't as tall stand in front so they can see whereas those blessed with greater height can stand further back and get the same effect. No one is sacrificing anything in order to achieve this result. And we can all benefit from the opportunities and resources around us. At Congregation Or Chadash, we strive to be sure that all of our members have access to all the resources that we have to offer, and we do all we can to minimize obstacles that may arise, whether physical, mental, emotional, etc. Equity is important.

Inclusion is probably the part of this trifecta that is most near and dear to me personally. As an "Autism Parent," I have been struggling to help my children find their way in a Neurotypical world and doing all in my power to make sure that they aren't excluded from any opportunities presented to their peers because of their disability. Congregation Or Chadash is one of the few places that I have never needed to fight this fight. From the moment we joined and my kids were enrolled in religious school, they were welcomed into the community. They do stand out everywhere we go. But at the temple, they're welcomed both despite of and because of their differences. The joy that my son shows listening to the choir (especially during Rosh Hashanah services) inspires those sitting around us. And my daughter's hyper-focus on trying to do the right thing also seems to make those around us smile. They teach the importance of kindness and understanding to their classmates as they are trying to understand why they didn't behave as was expected. And this is but one example from one household where inclusion is practiced at Congregation Or Chadash. "Inclusion" is important.

In the temple office, there is a poster on the bulletin board describing 7 Jewish Values for an inclusive Jewish Community. To me, the second on this list embodies all of this article and what we should include in every aspect of our lives:

Shalom Bayit: Peace In the Home

Our community centers, synagogues, youth groups, and camps are often our second homes. Everyone needs to feel comfortable, safe, and respected at home. Don't ostracize those who seem different. Strive to settle disagreements in peaceful and respectful ways that allow all community members to maintain their dignity.

And this defines our community at Congregation Or Chadash!

Summer often gives us a different sense of time and rhythm. Shabbat attendance sometimes shifts. People are away. There is no Religious School, etc. But, please know that Or Chadash remains an important home for many. Even if you are less active than in the past, please know that your support helps others engage in community. (And we invite you to be active/more active too!) So, recognizing that the summer changes pace for many people, here is a list of **Things You Can Jewishly Do This Summer** (in no particular order):

- 1) Read a Jewish book. Bonus: Join our COC Book Club
- 2) Keep snacks and water in your car. When you see a person who is homeless or struggling, offer them some water and food. Alternatively, or additionally, please continue to donate non-perishable food to Or Chadash which goes to Manna
- 3) Listen to Jewish music. Maybe join Or Chadash Singers, our COC Choir?!
- 4) We are taught that we are supposed to say 100 blessings a day. What if you make a list of 100 blessings you experience?
- 5) Come to Shabbat Services and bring a friend! Bonus if they are unaffiliated
- 6) Give tzedakah to Jewish causes
- 7) Read the weekly Torah portion and join us at Torah study!
- 8) Light Shabbat candles. Make Shabbat feel different than the rest of your week. Relax and rejuvenate.
- 9) Watch a Jewish movie
- 10) Invite other Or Chadash-ites to your house for a meal or have coffee with me. Rabbi would love to hear an update of how you are doing!

Congregation Or Chadash Kosher Policy

Please be mindful of our kosher policy. This includes any/all Temple events on Temple property plus Religious School and youth group field trips.

Kashrut is the term applied to foods that meet Jewish religious requirements. It is used in the sense of food that is ritually clean and edible. Kasher or Kosher means fit to eat. Congregation Or Chadash asks that all people using the building or on Temple grounds, including our members, show respect for our sacred tradition, so that all food served is acceptable to all of our members. Or Chadash follows Biblical Kosher rules meaning:

- There should be no treif at all in the building (i.e., no pig and no shellfish)
- Gelatin is made from pigs and is not okay. It is found in marshmallows and in many candies.
- There should be no mixing of milk and meat (includes chicken) throughout the entire event. This includes "large" or "small" ingredients. Examples include:
 - o Cheeseburgers
 - Chicken dinner with rolls and butter
 - Chicken dinner with ice cream for dessert
 - A cake made with butter at a meal with meat.
- There may not be dairy foods at one table and meat foods at a different table.

Pareve means something neutral, such as fish or eggs and can be served with either dairy or meat. It means the items cannot even have minor meat or milk ingredients.


Adult Education

Apologies to anyone we have forgotten to mention.




Congregation Or Chadash Book Club

Congregation Or Chadash is now a Partner Congregation in the Garden of Remembrance (Gan Zikaron) Memorial Park in Clarksburg, Maryland. The synagogue has purchased permanent interment rights in a section of the 150-acre nonprofit memorial park (see map on reverse).

The Garden of Remembrance memorial counselors are available to meet or speak with Or Chadash families to discuss advance planning or at-need arrangements and to assist in the selection of spaces in the Or Chadash section of the memorial park.


Or Chadash members and their families receive a 10% Partner Congregation reduction on the interment rights. The regular price is \$2,900* per space which is reduced to \$2,610 for Or Chadash members. All spaces also require a one-time \$290 fee towards the Perpetual Endowed Care Trust Fund.

To assist in planning, the following represent the current, usual costs* associated with a burial at Garden of Remembrance Memorial Park:
