I have been thinking a lot lately about the schisms erupting within our society. We struggle to have conversations with people who are "other" than us, however you define the word "other." Social media algorithms simply make it worse. It troubles me greatly, but then, I remind myself about the beauty of Judaism, for Judaism wants us to push back, to not accept this communal demise as the norm.

Judaism teaches us that we can learn from all people. In fact, Pirkei Avot (Ethics of our Sages), one of my favorite sacred texts (yes, I know I say that phrase a lot!), reminds us of the words of

Rabbi Ben Zoma. He said: "Who is

wise? One who learns from every person...Who is mighty? One who subdues one's [evil] inclination... Who is rich? One who rejoices in one's lot, as it is said: "You shall enjoy the fruit of your labors, you shall be happy and you shall prosper" Who is the one that is honored? One who honors their fellow human beings... Imagine if we followed this sage advice. Imagine if we allowed ourselves to learn from every person.

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

President's Column

Favorites.

For any parent, this word seems to come up quite a bit. Especially when our children are younger, parents ask their children "What is your favorite color?" or "....favorite food?". This is an easy concept for many children to understand as their brain doesn't fully understand subtlety. While their "favorites" may seem to change on a near-daily basis, it is an absolute in the moment. This is what they like the MOST (again, in the moment you ask the question).

My son also likes to think of things as "favorites". It is not an uncommon question for him to ask anyone in the family "What is your favorite <fill in the blank>?". Usually it relates to music. But with the approach of the December holiday season, he has been asking everyone what their favorite holiday is. You would think this would be an easy question to answer, but for me (at least this year), it has been anything but easy. Most holidays have their positives and negatives.

Passover is always one of the first things I think of when I think of a "favorite holiday". It involves a gathering of family and friends, a large meal, and a chance to rejoice in freedom hard fought. But it also reminds us of slavery and antisemitism. As a child, I remember enjoying those positives greatly ... my grandmother was an amazing cook and made the most elaborate seder dishes. We would often have family come in from out of town who I didn't see very often and I would have the chance to play with my cousins (most lived halfway across the country). And my grandfather would hide the afikomen in places one would never think of (well, at least that was my perspective at the time ... it was probably lying in plain sight). It was always a fun

evening and I would get the treats that only come with Passover for the week (even if I did have to eat the Matzoh). Trade-offs definitely tilted on the positive, and it was always my "favorite"

Even as an adult, Passover is probably still one of my favorite holidays. No, I'm still not a fan of Matzoh, but I do like many foods that we make with it (including Matzoh-Brie and my all time favorite matzoh farfel candy <my mother's specialty>). But now it comes with hard work. I'm the one preparing the meal and doing all the cleaning. The positive there is I get to choose the menu. But the process is a lot more labor intensive than I realized growing up and it has impacted on my enjoyment of the holiday (yes, I know I'm lazy). But despite that, I think I can declare, for my son's benefit, that my "favorite holiday" is Passover.

What's yours? And what makes it special? Is it the memories? Is it the food? Is it simply the story of what the holiday reminds us about?

I do think we can learn from everyone. We all have different strengths, different weaknesses, and we all see the world from our own vantage points. If instead of discarding those people with whom we disagree, with whom we view as "other" and instead view them as opportunities that can help us grow, the world would be in a better place. I am currently reading a book called *Thank You for Being Such a Pain* by Rosen (great title, right?!) The author reminds us of this very lesson, that everyone enters our lives for a reason, even, and perhaps especially, the difficult people in our lives. It is an important reminder.

What would your life be like if you looked at the difficult people in a different way? What if you tried to see those people as an opportunity for your own growth and learning? How would those encounters help you turn negative energy into more positive moments for yourself? It may not be possible in all situations, but I invite you to try. The world will be better if we stop putting people into the category of "other" and instead look at each individual with compassion and human dignity. May we all learn to follow Rabbi Ben Zoma's advice and learn from all people, subdue our evil inclinations, and find richness and happiness by lifting others up.

Social Action Committee

The Social Action Committee has had a busy fall and we would like to thank all of the congregants that contributed to our fall activities. In October we had a successful winter coat and outerwear drive. With your generosity we were able to completely fill an SUV with coats, hats, scarves, socks and gloves for those in need. Donations went to Everymind, a community organization that provides direct services and assistance to people who have mental health challenges and may be in crisis. Many of their clients are homeless and winter clothing is essential for their survival

In November, we turned our attention to the refugee community. With the elimination of government support for refugee resettlement, now more than ever, the refugee community needs to rely on volunteerism to assist with resettlement needs. New Neighbor Interfaith Alliance (NNIA) has stepped up to fill the gap. Or Chadash partners with NNIA to support newly settled refugees and asylum seekers in Montgomery County. In October, we filled laundry baskets with essential personal and household products. We were able to fill 20 baskets for families, doubling our efforts from last year. On November 18th, the President of NNIA and someone being served by NNIA presented on the work of NNIA and the difficulties refugees face coming to the United States. It was a moving presentation and resulted in additional people signing up to volunteer with NNIA. If you are interested in volunteering and have not signed up, please email Debbie Eisenberg or Arlene Greenspan. Volunteer opportunities vary in type and commitment and can be as simple as taking someone to a doctor's appointment, donating used furniture, or ongoing activities such as tutoring English, case management, or helping with finding a job for a refugee.



In 2026, our first project will be filling backpacks for children entering foster care. In addition to supplying backpacks, we will be asking congregants to help with items to fill these backpacks such as pajamas, soap, shampoo, books, and stuffed animals. (Children often have little notice and are just given a trash bag for packing.) These donations not only meet initial needs but give children dignity upon entering their new foster care home. This is being done in coordination with Comfort Cases, a nonprofit organization that works to provide each child with "a bag they can call their own" (and some essential items) as he or she gets relocated.

This year to add a more personal touch, we will be working with the Religious School Committee to have students write a personal note for each backpack.

Specific items will be announced in Happening using SignUp Genius, beginning January 8th. Donations will be ongoing through the first week in February. A bin labeled Comfort Cases will be placed in the lobby for donations. You may also order items and have them delivered to Or Chadash. We will be filling backpacks on February 8 at 12:00pm, directly after Sunday School.


